About This Year's Class:



This beautiful butterfly will be worked with 6-strand cotton and ray on threads over Miracle Wire (DMC) and mounted on a satin box. The body of the butterfly will be made of beads with the antennae of the Miracle Wire. Judy is kitting this in TWO COL-OR COMBINATIONS- Blue/Green (shown) or Purple/Green (threads wrapped on card in photo)

The stitches will be satin, buttonhole, stem, needle painting (long and short) and bead embroidery.

## GCC Report – Barbara Fraize

The MAR Board has chosen *How Does Your Garden Grow?*, by Carol Currier, as the 2013 Fall GCC offering. This piece is a basic study of crewel stitches and techniques. The simple design is worked on crewel linen or linen twill in the student's choice of colors.

The course outline includes a brief history of crewel embroidery, descriptions of threads, fabrics and tools, a stitch glossary useful for other projects, plus washing and blocking instructions.

Designed to appeal to beginner stitchers both young and old, the student is encouraged to add or subtract from the design. For example, if a bird is not appealing, the student can put a favorite pet into the embroidery design.

Teacher: Carol Peao Currier

Project: Framed picture or pillow

Size: 6" x 8" but the student may enlarge the design if desired

Threads: Crewel wool

Colors: Student's choice



How Does Your Garden Grow by Carol Currier

Cost: \$40 per student (\$35 for text, \$5 for postage); includes large color photograph

Supplies (approximate): \$40 or less if supplies are shared. (Note: A supply list will be emailed to students upon enrollment.)

I would like to share the results to encourage others that are not done yet, no matter how seasoned they are.

Delaware Sampler Symposium Biggs Museum, Dover, DE March 21-23, 2014

Lynne Anderson of the Sampler Consortium has **re-scheduled the DELAWARE SYMPOSIUM, from November to March 21,22,23, 2014**. The site chosen is the Biggs Museum in Dover, DE. There will be lectures, field trips, classes and hopefully, a sampler exhibition and catalog. The focus of the exhibition and catalog will feature Family Records and other Delaware needlework that records family names and/or initials. The title is "Wrought with Careful Hand: Ties of Kinship on Delaware Samplers". The following quote comes from a verse on a Family Record sampler:

## Through the Needle's Eye - 20<sup>th</sup> National EGA Exhibit



Participation in the 20<sup>th</sup> National Exhibit is open to EGA members and the public. There will be two categories: Original and Adaptation. Using EGA definitions, an original work is one which, from the beginning, is solely the creative product of the stitcher. An adaptation is needlework inspired by or based upon a source other than needlework and modified through significant design changes.

The exhibit will be juried and judged by a panel of three judges. Original needlework by EGA members will be eligible to receive the Diana Grossman Memorial Award. All needlework will be eligible for the Virginia Miller Contemporary Needlework Award and the Judge's Choice Awards.

In addition to the exhibit awards, the Mid-Atlantic Region is offering a \$150 award to a participating MAR member. The exhibit judges will determine the winner of this award, as well.

## A Request for Help

I am a textile historian who has received three EGA Research Fellowship awards and published four articles in *Needle Arts*. My current research is on Martha Mood and I wondered if you could help me to locate and promote her work which incorporated embroidery.

Martha Mood (1908-1972) was a San Antonio artist who turned to fibers in the late 1950s. She was well known in the Texas art world during her lifetime, and worked closely with architect O'Neil Ford who owned one of the over 500 wall hangings she created using cloth, embroidery stitches, and other needlework techniques. All of her work is signed with her name on the front.

The goal of this research project is to reintroduce the world to her work via a website, multiple publications, and possibly an exhibit (not yet organized). I hope to locate as many of 'stitcheries' (her term) as possible, as well as other artifacts created/designed by Martha Mood. Some of these works are in museums, but many are in private collections.

#### MAR PRiDe Scholarship Report By Rose Marie Wert

I was so thrilled to receive the 2011 MAR PRiDe Scholarship to attend the 5<sup>th</sup> International Embroidery Conference: *Embroidery of the Americas and The Influence of Colonization* held Sept. 8- 10, 2011, at the Naples Grande Beach Resort in Naples, Florida, immediately preceding the Flamingo Fandango - EGA National Seminar 2011!!!!

Thursday evening, September 8<sup>th</sup>, Eva Fognell of Cooperstown, New York, presented her lecture "Native American Quill and Moose Hair Embroidery". She reported that the porcupine's habitat spans from Alaska to Nova Scotia. The indigenous women took the quil Is and dyed them with vegetable colors: red, yellow, black and blue. Some pressed these quills flat while others did not but they would at least snip off the rough points so that the dyes would penetrate. The Quillwork presented during the lecture was 20 ½" x 6 ½", dated from 1780 to 1796 and was an example of an individual visionary experience with signs seen in dreams. As such, it represented the spirit world from the thunderbird - the preeminent theme of the skyworld- to the turtle as symbol of the underworld.

The Moosehair Sofa or Settee was a result of the French Ursuline Nuns who traveled to Quebec in the late 1600's. These Nuns had little access to traditional threads as such and therefore turned to natural resources, in particular, the moose hair which they employed as embroidery floss. The Ursulines taught floral embroidery using the moose hair on birch bark. The height of this embroidery was in the 1760's and by the 1800's there was no more indication of it continuing. The settee itself is 13" long and 6" in height and appears in volume 20 of the Heritage Magazine of the New York State Historical Association.

Two stitches appeared in this type of work: a knotted stitch which was brought up from the bark, knotted and taken back again and a bristle technique. Likewise, two scenes were often depicted: a floral with greens and berries and a native scene usually set in front of a fire. These were for trade or sale but the floral designs were seen on clothing. The stitching on birch bark was done when the bark was wet s o that it could be pierced by an awl and the hair pulled through. When dry, the hair was held in place.

Beadwork was in use before the European explorers arrived with their glass beads from Venice, Bohemia and Holland. Natives had their beads from shell, bone and animal teeth. They valued the healing properties of the white shell. This beadwork was found among the Seneca of New York as well as the Mohawk and Iroquois. Two types of stitches appear on their items: the lacy stitch in which four or five beads were placed on a thread and the box stitch whereby a single bead was threaded and stitched one to two times. In summation: art forms appeared as uncorrupted art work of the Indian women before the European influence. A radical change occurred as a result of the European immigration during the 1700's through the 1900's not as a corruption rather as a way of incorporating the new with the old and as a means of survival with a cash economy.

Friday morning, Sept. 9<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Ellen Clark of Texas presented "Huipiles: A Fabric of Identity". A <u>huipil</u> is a loose rectangular garment with a hole in the middle and made of cotton, wool, or silk. The word itself is of Nahuatl descent with <u>huipoopi</u> meaning a blouse loose or tucked into a skirt called a <u>cueitl</u>. A <u>cuetl huipil</u> was a skirt and blouse and became a metaphor for "woman". Most huipiles were woven on a backstrap loom by the women of southern Mexico and Guatemala: the Mixtecas, Chinantes, Zaucalpas, the Triquesas, and the Zapotecas. The powerful Mayan Lady Xoc 725 AD of Yaxchilan, Chiapa, Mexico wore huipiles with a rounded collar. During the Mayan times, as well as today, clothing could "transform a person and a person could transform the garment". The huipil is for everyday wear as well as ceremonial occasions. It tells who wove it, who wears it, who she is, where she's from, her place in society, as well as her marital status, religion, power and personality. Each region and area displays a distinctive shape, design, style and color. Designs are timeless.

A <u>Yalalog</u> is a huipil embroidered with geometric designs instead of floral ones. Today huipiles are being worn more in societies of Mexican descent to reflect femininity, identity, strength, tradition, values and culture.

Dr. Clark is a Professor of Bicultural Bilingual Studies at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

The third presenter was Kimberly Ivey of Colonial Williamsburg with "Early British Needlework on American Samplers". She is the associate curator of Textiles and Needlework at the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.

Kimberley's research showed that the Johan Sibmacher's Pattern Book published in 1604 in Muehlenburg proved floral designs were indeed available. Crewel work was done on a twill ground. Various teachers advertised themselves as "lately arrived from London" to obtain the notice of families who wanted their daughters to be trained in the field of needlework and to make them prized by potential suitors.

During the early 18<sup>th</sup> century, British influence was seen in technique and designs with alphabets, vines and flowers often in reversible stitching. The poetry and book quotes were stitched in many Virginia samplers. Quotes from the Bible were also evident and expressed in white work and candle wicking.

A change was seen in Massachusetts Samplers from a long piece to a more rectangular picture form. Pastoral and hunting scen es were evident often with reclining shepherds, a trio of sheep (two white and one black,) birds, and bees.

Needlework in the Chesapeake Area (Virginia, Maryland and Delaware) reflected the taste, fashion and politics with neat and precise stitching techniques including a reverse marking cross, an Irish stitch and the Queen stitch reversing to a four-sided stitch.

The influence of British Religious Affiliations was illustrated in the Quaker Samplers with their reflections of equality, simplicity, and peace. The Westtown Boarding School, established in 1794 outside West Chester, Pennsylvania, began with plain darning samplers of white silk thread on natural linen of 27 to 30 stitches per inch. Eventually floral sprays, eight-pointed stars, Johnny jump-ups, French pinks, roses and lilies of the valley appeared.

Jill Hall started the afternoon by presenting "A Paradise In Silk and Gold: the Plimouth Jacket". Jill is the expert on the first seven years of the Pilgrims and during the Autumn of 2006 started the Plimouth Jacket Project (Faith) which is a recreation of a 17<sup>th</sup> century jacket. She described the process of planning the garment and assessing the skills of those stitchers involved in producing the jacket worked in silk and metal threads and lace. Jill was a consultant on the History Channel's "Desperate Crossings: The Untold Story of the Mayflower".
